LEGISLATIVE DIRECTOR

LCDR James Clenney USN (Ret.)

Do you know who MOAA is by our numbers and service reputation?

MOAA is the nation's largest military service organization with over 360,000 Members and the fourth largest veteran service organization. Our mission is both simple and challenging – Advocacy for the Eight uniformed services.

We perform the functions through focusing on appropriate <u>Legislative priorities</u>. We concentrate our attention and efforts on servicemembers past and present, their families and survivors; healthcare, compensation, and benefits. We continue to serve as officers by advocating for all servicemembers regardless of rank or rating. MOAA has been recognized as "Top Lobbyist for Associations" for each of the last 16 years. Go to **moaa.quorum.us** to join and amplify your message to Congress. You can also login on your smart phone.

What happens with every new Congress?

Historically the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) is asked – How can the Government reduce spending? The CBO opens their filing cabinets and pulls out previous ideas on military benefits. These most recently include recommendations to increase TRICARE fees, institute TFL enrollment fees, eliminate concurrent receipt, end IU at retirement age, etc. This year they proposed a new and contentious idea; Develop a Means test focused on VA disability compensation. This idea (if accepted by Congress) would reduce compensation for veterans making over a set amount or make disability compensation taxable. MOAA and The Military Coalition remain steadfast to fight these "tired" and newly outrageous proposals. We will fight together through constant vigilance and timely engagement with our elected officials.

The following legislation listing of high impact issues on the following page coming up before congress outlines the numbers of sponsors from Arizona and the total number of sponsors who have signed on nationwide. Our advocacy mission is to increase the sponsors to these bills. I request your attention and involvement.

Arizona - there is only 1 AZ Rep recorded as a cosponsor US - 74 cosponsors

H.R.1277/S.596 Military Spouse Hiring

Arizona - 5 Reps 2 Senators US - 141 Reps 48 Sen

H.R.2537/S.1823 Restore BAH

Arizona - only 1 AZ Rep is on board US - 58 Reps 2 Sen

H.R.3232/S.1588 Respect for Grieving Families

Arizona - no AZ cosponsors (yet) US - 17 Reps 3 Sen

H.R.1083/S.414 Caring for Survivors act (DIC increase)

Arizona - only 2 AZ Reps, no Senators (yet) US - 59 Reps 21 Sen

MOAA National Legislative Activity Highlights

Pay Raises: MOAA has fought to ensure those who serve get what they've earned and has been part of efforts in recent years to secure the largest raise in a decade.

Widow's Tax: Repeal of the SBC-DIC offset for surviving spouses in the FY 2020 NDAA.

- **MTF Restructuring:** With the FY 2020, 2021 and 2022 NDAA laws, MOAA has achieved three consecutive halts to planned medical billet cuts along with enhanced congressional oversight to MHS reforms
- **Protecting Tricare Benefits:** MOAA has long fought legislation that would burden TRI-CARE beneficiaries with additional costs as a way to address budget shortfalls in other areas.
- <u>Military Housing Reform</u>: The FY 2020 NDAA included a number of provisions to improve the day-to-day lives of military families, part of the most sweeping military housing reform in a quarter-century.
- **<u>PACT Act:</u>** Comprehensive toxic exposure reform which expands care and benefits to millions of veterans dating back to the Vietnam War era.
- **MISSION Act:** MOAA fought for this historic bill which provides sweeping reform to VA programs.
- <u>**GI Bill Upgrades:**</u> MOAA secured a major victory for servicemembers and military families with the passage of the Post-9/11 Veterans Educational Assistance Act of 2008, better known as the Post-9/11 GI Bill.
- **Defeating 'COLA Minus 1 Percent:** MOAA fought and won a repeal of language passed in a late-2013 continuing resolution would have cut any cost-of-living (COLA) adjust-

We encourage members or their spouses to consider stepping up and filling one of these positions and "Never Stop Serving".








